

INFORMATION ABOUT THE VULNERABILITY REPORT WITHIN THE MIGRANT REGULARIZATION PROCESS

WHEN IS A VULNERABILITY REPORT REQUIRED?

In some cases, applicants must provide a **Vulnerability Situation Report**. The request for this certificate must be submitted through a municipal application form.

WHAT IS UNDERSTOOD BY A SITUATION OF VULNERABILITY?

For the sole purpose of this regularization process, a person will be considered to be in a situation of vulnerability when, due to his/her irregular administrative status, personal, economic, social, psychosocial, or housing-related circumstances affect their living conditions or their effective access to basic rights.

This is not a general assessment, but one specifically linked to the impact that irregular administrative status has on the person's life.

WHO NEEDS THIS REPORT?

This document is not compulsory for everyone. It is only required if:

You have not applied for asylum.

You cannot prove that you have worked in Spain.

You do not have close family members in Spain (children under 18 years old, children with disabilities, or dependent parents)

You do not have a job offer and do not intend to become self-employed.

If you can prove that you have applied for asylum, that you have worked, that you have this type of family connection, or that you will submit a job offer or proof of self-employment, **YOU DO NOT NEED THIS VULNERABILITY REPORT**.

HOW ARE VULNERABILITY REPORTS BEING ISSUED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF LEÓN?

In order for Social Services to issue the Vulnerability Report, applicants must submit the official application form at the Municipal Registry offices.

The Town Council of León, through the Department of Social Welfare and Youth, together with the Basic Social Care Teams (CEAS) and the Municipal Centre of Migrants, has organized the issuance of vulnerability reports through Social Services.

An internal protocol has been established with two different situations:

- People who have previously been assisted by Social Services: the report will be issued based on previous interventions, and applicants will be notified when it is ready for collection at the Padre Isla Centre.
- People without a previous Social Services record: they will be contacted for an interview in which they can explain their social situation to prove their vulnerability.

Certificates of residence will be added to the files directly, without migrants needing to request or pay for them.

In addition, there is an information service available at CEMAI situated in La Madalena Avenue, number 1, Social Centre el Crucero. Opening hours: Monday to Friday from 9:00 am to 2:00 pm. Telephone number: 987 27 69 86

The extraordinary regularization process began on 16th April 2026 and will remain open until 30th June 2026.
